

Rick Jackson, GOP Nominee, Requests Meeting

On June 10, five representatives of GSRA met with Republican gubernatorial candidate Rick Jackson. The meeting was at Mr. Jackson's office in Alpharetta and lasted over an hour.

Mr. Jackson asked many penetrating questions, listened attentively to responses and offered perceptive observations. He understood the hardships that retirees now face from the precipitous decline in our purchasing power. He declared that it was a "moral imperative" to honor the state's commitment to retirees, and that addressing the state's failure to do so, "...would not be swept under the rug..." should he be elected.

After being informed of the actuarial cost projections for restoring our COLAs, Mr. Jackson said that he had some different ideas as to how that might be accomplished. While Mr. Jackson, not surprisingly, did not commit to specific dollar amounts and timelines, he stated emphatically that he intended to resolve our COLA issue once and for all. He said he needed to research our issue further before he would be comfortable sharing those ideas.

Mr. Jackson said he had requested this meeting because there have been ERS retirees at his campaign stops all complaining about how the state has wronged us by discontinuing COLAs. Chalk this up as another victory due to GSRA members actively advocating on all our behalf.

All GSRA attendees agreed that the meeting was very productive and expressed our appreciation. Afterwards, two senior staff informed us that Mr. Jackson had been impressed with our discussion points and that he "...is committed to making things right." The participating GSRA representatives were Central Metro Chapter Former President Sam Shepherd, Keith Golden, Col. Eddie Henderson, Lobbyist Chuck Clay, and Legislation Committee Chair Chuck Freedman.

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Candidates Support Restoring COLAs

GSRA received statements from several candidates on our Facebook page.

The following was received from Sen. Greg Dolezal, Republican nominee for lieutenant governor: “Georgia State Retirees Association, happy to reply here for all to see. I was supportive of the \$100m and am disappointed to see it removed. I am supportive of future investments in ERS required to fulfill our commitment of a 3% COLA to our retirees. We need to get out of the business of random COLAs and get into a predictable cadence, and the \$100m was going to be a step toward that goal.”

Representative Debbie Buckner issued the following: “State retirees have lost nearly 40% of their purchasing power to inflation. Many have experienced an even greater financial strain due to rising healthcare costs. Countless retirees have experienced even greater financial duress, in the face of daily challenges including increased food costs, transportation related costs, the out-of-pocket costs of necessary medications, and the cost of housing. In FY 2023, \$150 million was added to the budget as an investment to support COLAs averaging approximately 1.1% to 1.2%. This was an important first step toward addressing years of declining purchasing power for our retirees.

This past 2026 session, an additional \$100 million in total funds was appropriated to support COLAs by increasing the employer contribution for the Employees’ Retirement System. That investment was to trigger regular and annual cost-of-living adjustments. Eliminating this investment severely hampers the critical lifeline intended to help retired state employees stabilize what little purchasing power they have left. While neither increase is large enough to fully offset retirees’ cumulative losses, these investments represent meaningful incremental progress toward achieving the goal of assuring state retirees with more consistent, predictable, and meaningful cost-of-living adjustments. Without this year’s \$100 million, retirees are denied the ability to stabilize their purchasing power. It prolongs their financial hardships and undermines the effort to provide a more secure retirement for those who dedicated their careers to public service for our State.”

Other candidates also issued formal statements, including Lt. Governor Burt Jones, retired commissioner Michael Thurmond and Blake Tillery. Lt. Governor Jones also met with us for over an hour.

GSRA will soon be reaching out to Senators Dolezal and McLaurin, and the Democratic gubernatorial nominee Keisha Lance Bottoms for meetings.

Putting Things in Perspective

The 2.25% COLA for ERS retirees was not removed and is still scheduled to be paid in July 2026. This remains intact due to earlier budget actions and is not affected by the Governor's recent decision.

State retirees continue to process Governor Kemp's recent directive instructing ERS to disregard the unanimously approved \$100 million appropriation intended to help restore dependable, consistent COLAs. Many retirees understandably feel shocked, disappointed, and a sense of loss. However, the group emphasizes that these emotions should not be directed toward the legislators who worked tirelessly on their behalf.

Several key leaders championed the funding effort:

- **Sen. Blake Tillery**, Senate Appropriations Chair, collaborated closely with retiree advocates and secured \$100 million in the Senate budget.
- **Lt. Governor Burt Jones** supported the effort and ensured the funding remained intact.
- **Speaker Jon Burns** and **House Appropriations Chair Matt Hatchett** backed the COLA funding through the conference committee process.
- **Sen. Billy Hickman** and **Sen. Rick Williams** consistently advocated for retirees throughout the session.

Both Lt. Governor Jones and Sen. Tillery reaffirmed their commitment following the Governor's action. Jones stated that he will "*continue to fight for long overdue cost-of-living adjustments*" and pledged future support, including additional funding in FY 2027. Tillery noted that while the decision is a setback, it does not affect the 2.25% COLA retirees will receive this year due to earlier budget infusions.

The group expresses deep disappointment in Governor Kemp's decision and underscores that elections for top statewide offices have real consequences for retirees. They highlight that several leaders have demonstrated clear, consistent support — and they welcome additional candidates to join in backing state retirees.

On May 19, the Atlanta Journal and Constitution published an article titled "**BRIAN KEMP'S BUDGET AX FALLS ON RAISES FOR STATE RETIREES**". The journalist, David Wickert did a good job explaining the issue. Governor Kemp's communication director indicated the \$100 million was cut to help pay for the income tax cut lawmakers passed. Chuck Freeman was quoted explaining Georgia's retirement benefits helped the state attract and retain employees who would otherwise could have made more money in the private sector. He further stated that he appreciates what Kemp and legislators have done to bolster retirement benefits in recent years. But he said retirees are having a hard time paying for basic expenses like food and medical care, even before the most recent bout of inflation.



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GSRA Board Holds Retreat

Your GSRA Board (Board) held a retreat on June 4th in Macon. The retreat, facilitated by former Board President, Jim Sommerville, provided an opportunity to have in-depth discussions about the current GSRA Strategic Plan (Plan) and to discuss new challenges and priorities that are not addressed in the Plan.

The Plan was developed over a period of about two years by a working group of board members, led by Sommerville and assisted and guided by a consultant from the Fannin Institute on Leadership at the University of Georgia. The group began their work in 2020, as the global COVID pandemic threatened GSRA's very existence. Rather than "turning out the lights," they used the time on many Zoom call sessions to produce the initial plan in 2022. The result was the framework for moving GSRA forward over the next three-year period, 2023-2025. Input from GSRA members and partners, gathered through member surveys and key informant interviews, was essential to the group being able to complete the task. The Plan reflects what members thought was the most important work for us to be doing on your behalf.

The Vision and Mission statements establish the foundation of the Plan and set the direction of our organization:

"The **Georgia State Retirees Association** (GSRA) envisions a future in which all state retirees and employees receive the retirement and healthcare benefits promised to them so that they may have a secure and dignified retirement.

To that end, GSRA advocates and educates to protect promised retirement and healthcare benefits for Georgia's state retirees and current employees."

With these guiding statements in mind, the Board discussed at length the two critical *co*-equal and interdependent issues or priorities that ground the Plan:

- Protect and advocate for retiree benefits
- Grow the organization's impact through strong membership and participation

While significant progress has been made in protecting and advocating for retiree benefits, including the partial restoration of an annual COLA for state retirees, less progress has been realized in increasing GSRA's impact through increased membership.

The Board discussed potential additional actions and strategies needed to fully meet each of the priorities contained in the Plan. These new actions and strategies will be further discussed at future board meetings

The Board also discussed how to meet the challenges of a new Governor and several upcoming changes in key legislative committee chairs.

Potential new priorities that may need to be addressed soon in order for GSRA to increase membership significantly were also discussed.

The retreat provided an orientation to the Plan to Board members who were not in place during the original planning process and will serve as a springboard for next steps and making decisions for the future. The retreat provided a great opportunity to discuss in depth where GSRA is now and where it needs to be to meet the future challenges of protecting and/or improving the retirement benefits of retired and active state employees.

GSRA experienced its most successful Legislative Session in recent memory in 2026, securing a 2.25% COLA, funding to increase the ERS's funded liability, and money for ongoing COLAs (which was later "disregarded" by Governor Kemp). Most importantly, we made allies in both the House and, especially, the Senate. Commitments of support from Lt. Governor Burt Jones (President of the Senate), Senate Appropriation Chair Blake Tillery, and both the Senate Appropriations and Retirement Committees. How did we do it? We did it because of our great strength and our responsible advocacy.

Our great strength lies in our numbers. We now have over 6000 members for the first time ever. More importantly, however, it is the strength of our commitment, our dedication, and our unity in striving to reach our goal. Our members responded in great numbers to our Action Alerts, writing, emailing, and calling their legislators to push our cause. We showed up in strength at the Capitol to pack the committee hearing rooms. We made our voices heard over and over.

We did it by responsible advocacy as well. While we were passionate, rational, and persistent, we were also respectful to our legislators. We thanked them for their efforts on our behalf, and we were not aggressive, hostile, or accusatory for their past lack of support. Through these efforts, we came close to reaching the mountaintop and seeing our efforts rewarded.

We want to make our 2026 Annual Meeting the continuation of our success. We want to increase our strength with more members, more outreach, and most importantly, more advocacy. The job is not finished. We cannot let our elected officials think they've heard the last of us now that we've gotten a COLA. We must continue to press them on funding for ongoing COLAs. That will take even more strength, more advocacy.

We will meet once again at the Robert F. Hatcher Center in Macon this year. We will gather at the venue at Middle Georgia State University on Monday and Tuesday, October 5-6, 2026, beginning at 12:30 on Monday and adjourning at 2:30 on Tuesday. We will invite the gubernatorial candidates, Keisha Lance Bottoms and Rick Jackson, to join us, hopefully in person; if not, by video. We'll have a hot buffet lunch and updates from SHBP and ERS. We'll have a Monday afternoon reception with hors d'oeuvres, beer, wine, and music. We'll have some excellent and timely workshops.

Mark your calendars for October 5-6, 2026, at the Robert F. Hatcher Center on the campus of Middle Georgia State University. We are excited for what will be another fun, successful Annual Meeting. Come join us and celebrate our strength and successful advocacy. See you there!

However, concerns were raised after Governor Brian Kemp vetoed the measure Wednesday as part of multiple line-item vetoes associated with the upcoming Fiscal Year 2027 state budget.

Association members emphasized the importance of continuing dialogue with elected officials to ensure state retirees receive the benefits they were promised after years of dedicated public service. The Southeast Chapter remains committed to advocating for retirees across the region and encouraging civic engagement on issues affecting Georgia's retired state employees.

The chapter expressed appreciation to all members and guests who attended the meeting and encouraged retirees to remain informed and involved as legislative discussions continue in the months ahead.

We had two exceptional speakers including Mike Webster, currently a Professor at Valdosta State University and Janet Reese, Vice President of SuperPatch.

Dr. Webster, who holds a PhD in Exercise Physiology and has spent 35 years in higher-education teaching and research, delivered a presentation titled "AI – The World at Your Fingertips." He began by asking how many attendees had experience with AI, with only a few responding. He explained that Artificial Intelligence is advancing rapidly, describing it as a "bottomless pit" and noting that traditional tools like Google are becoming outdated.

He emphasized that imagination drives innovation, calling AI a preview of the future. He discussed ChatGPT and cloud-based AI tools, explaining that users can ask questions and receive instant answers. Dr. Webster highlighted both the phenomenal benefits of AI—such as detecting details in MRI scans that the human eye cannot see, including 3D visualization—and the potential dark side of the technology.



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Ms. Reese has been a hairstylist/salon owner for over 21 years, presented information about SuperPatch technology. She began by sharing a personal story about her father, who had been bedridden for more than four years. After discovering SuperPatch on social media, she tried it on him, and the improvement she witnessed inspired her to share the product with others. She distributed brochures and asked attendees whether they experienced balance issues or body pain; several said yes. She explained the different patch types—Freedom, Liberty, Victory, Depend, and Peace—and described how each one supports different physical needs. According to her, the patches have no side effects and work by sending signals through the skin to the nervous system and brain. They can be worn for up to three days, including in the shower.

She demonstrated the patches on 6–8 attendees, who reported feeling immediate effects. She stated pricing ranges from \$25 to \$75, depending on quantity, and explained that orders could be placed through her or the company website.

Several GSRA specific topics were discussed. Members were reminded that the GSRA T-shirts are available for sale on the website at www.MyGSRA.com. Membership and dues were discussed that it's due once a year from the time one joins and that retirees could have the \$2 deducted from their monthly pension, which would make it easier. This year's GSRA Annual meeting is scheduled for October 5th & 6th at the Robert F. Hatcher Conference Center, Macon, GA. Information has been emailed out about the dates and registration.

Overall, we had another great meeting, and the next one is scheduled for September 17, 2026 at the same time and perhaps the same location. Lunch announcement for Olive Garden was made for 12:30. A group picture was taken and we adjourned.
